

Figures in the Landscape workshop by Madeleine Szymanski

Bicheno, 4th and 5th November, 2017 ASMA (Tas) has again provided its members with an extremely worthwhile Bicheno workshop. The tutor, Madeleine Szymanski from NSW, wins medals in our Annual Awards Exhibitions most years for her delicate watercolours and collagraphs. Saturday started off with copying a line portrait drawing upside down. Duplicating the images proved interesting, but everybody came up with a good reproduction. This showed us that portraits are not impossible; we just need to be aware of shapes, rather than getting hung up on details.

Following this, we had a demonstration of how Madeleine goes about developing one of her watercolours. She emphasised the importance of doing small tonal sketches before commencing a piece, to ensure the concept will work. She then showed us a print of an old photograph of a mother and baby, from which she drew a sketch of the two from about waist height up, with a rosebush backdrop. This was transferred to a large piece of watercolour paper. We were shown how to lay in a water wash and then drop in background elements in a loose manner, letting edges blend together so as not to draw the eye from the portrait. After this, the mother and daughter were painted in, with consideration given to lost and found edges. Two other important issues were stressed as well positive and negative space and the inclusion of reflected colours.

Madeleine was unable to demonstrate her collagraph techniques, but provided us with some useful details of how it is done. She makes plates in reverse and inks them in readiness to make a print. An acrylic binder medium is used to seal the plate and attach a variety of materials, including things like silk organza, scrunched up rice paper, fine threads and dry leaves. Madeleine also handed out some notes, entitled "Madeleine's Memos (for the days when it all seems too hard)", two of which I will include here:

Put yourself in front of the paper and you're halfway there. Don't listen to the old Left-brain trying to distract you. (You've got to be suspicious when doing the ironing is presented as an attractive alternative).

Always carry a little sketchbook around with you. (You can also try drawing in it.) A fine felt-tip pen doesn't get as smudgy as pencil. Usually people don't take any notice - or possibly they might think you are a private detective with an interesting life. Participants produced some wonderful results - a reflection of the standard of the tutor, who we thank for her efforts.

Plan to attend the workshop next year, which will be on scratchboard!


